Topic Explanation

This project aims to revive a tradition of decentralised and competitive federalism in European integration, and to apply its teachings to current European challenges. For convenience, this tradition is here associated with the name of the Nobel-prize winning economist Friedrich Hayek. However, a sizable group of liberal, conservative and Christian democratic thinkers, including such prominent names as Ludwig Erhard, Luigi Einaudi and Wilhelm Röpke, defended some variations of it. Their federation was not a strong and intrusive central government, but a limited framework for continental openness, dealing with core federal functions: defence, foreign policy and the four freedoms of the internal market. By contrast, in Spinelli's model of European integration, unfortunately the best known and most influential, both the federal government and the federated entities are programmatically intrusive and centralised.

The debate on the future of the EU has so far been polarised between a progressive centralist vision that is reminiscent of Spinellian federalism and a populist vision that questions the very existence of supranational institutions. The goal of this publication is to show that a third way between these two extremes is possible, one that combines limited continental unity with national autonomy, decentralisation and competition.
